


# God Continues To Bless The Work In Baja

# Getting to Know Your Elders

Last month, we began a series of articles to help us get acquainted with our Mayfair elders. This month, we learn about Cliff Mann and Jamie Neidert and their families as each of these men shared with us a little of their history and how they came to be at Mayfair.

#### **Cliff Mann**

I was blessed to grow up on a farm in the Owens Cross Roads area. I attended the Owens Cross Roads Church of Christ with my parents, grandparents, and great-grandparents. I remember my greatgrandmother taking the glass communion cups home and washing them each week. All my life I had heard about the love of God and Jesus' sacrifice for us, but it wasn't until a Gospel meeting one summer when the guest preacher made hell seem hotter than usual that I decided to act and be baptized.

## Johnnie Swaim

Johnnie Marie (McMurtrie) Swaim was born on September 25th, 1930, in Huntsville, Alabama. She will turn 94 this year.

She was the second daughter out of six children to her parents John and Minnie McMurtrie who lived off Highway 72 West. Her father was an avid farmer, who raised and sold livestock (mainly beef) and food products and her mother was a homemaker. Her parents attended the Berea Church of Christ and the Fanning Heights Church of Christ.

Johnnie had four sisters, Evelyn, Bertie, Lorene, and Jean, and one brother, William McMurtrie. Her brother, William, and his wife and family attended Twickenham Church of Christ where he was a deacon for many years.

She met her future husband William "Bill" D. Swaim, Jr. in 1957 while attending the Central Church of Christ where his mother and father were members. They married on February 1st, 1958, and first lived on Ward Avenue and attended Mayfair Church of Christ on Bob Wallace Avenue. Later their family attended the Memorial Parkway Church of Christ (now known as the Chase Park Church of Christ), but returned to Mayfair in 1988.

Throughout the years, they attended weekly wor-

ship services, as well as Sunday and Wednesday Bible classes. Johnnie helped with Vacation Bible School, communion preparation, showers, and teas. Over the years, she taught children's classes with her youngest daughter, Joni Swaim, while Bill counted the contribution and served communion.

Johnnie had many hobbies including music, exercising, bowling, sewing, and traveling. She began her career in the 1950s, first at Rose Jewelry downtown on the square in Huntsville, before going to work at Redstone Arsenal. She began her 37-year career as a federal civilian employee at Redstone Arsenal, working in the Defense Department for the U.S. Army. She started in Procurement Planning and finished in the Multiple Launch Rocket System (MLRS) Project Office. Following her retirement from the federal government, Johnnie continued working as a contractor until 2005, when she and Bill both decided to retire at the ages of 73 and 76. Bill passed away in 2019.

As parents Johnnie and Bill, both believed in loving Godly instruction, talking through misunderstandings, helping with homework, attending any activities whether sports or academic events, and always providing the very best Godly guidance in love for one another and their children.

## SSS – What's That?

About two years ago, the Mayfair elders suggested they would like to form a support group for widows and asked me to organize it. As a recent widow, I thought this would be helpful and reached out to Joyce Hall and Trudy Moore, who have contributed tremendously.

At the first meeting, we talked about the purpose of our group. We looked at several scriptures. In 2 Corinthians 1:3-7, we are told about a God of Comfort and how we learn how to give comfort by being comforted. Our best comfort often comes from having a good listener.

Galatians 6:2 tells us to "Bear one another's burdens." By being there for each other, we are indeed bearing one another's burdens.

Hebrews 10:25 describes how we gather to encourage one another. Loneliness can be a major issue and gathering with others can help. We agreed that we wanted to support each other.

We chose a name for our group, SSS, which stands for Sisters Supporting Sisters. Our group includes widows, singles, and singles again. It is designed to give support to women who are alone. We meet monthly for a meal and fellowship. We spend time getting to know others and providing support.

At first, we were meeting in restaurants and often we were given a long table so we could only communicate with the 3-4 people around us. Then we met in the Garden Room at Mayfair and noticed we could get to know more people sitting at the round tables. We need to get acquainted with people, so we feel comfortable sharing our concerns and helping others. Mayfair provides a meal six times per year and an anonymous donor provides six meals, so we are now able to meet at Mayfair and have a meal provided each month. We sometimes have a speaker to give a brief devotional, but we desire to get to know others so we can be of support.

We know it is particularly difficult in those early days and months of being alone. It is extremely helpful to be with others who understand and can give support or just a listening ear when we need it most.

Early on, we decided it would be nice to share some resources we had used in the community and found helpful. These included painters, roofers,

plumbers, etc. that someone in the group had used and thought did good work and treated customers fairly. We have a list available we can share if you would like a copy. Some members of our group are currently working on a booklet that would be helpful for new widows. The plan is to share this with new widows soon after their loss.

We have a list of 155 ladies in this group, but we are trying to reach others as well through email and online announcements. If you are in this group or know of someone who is, please share this information. We would love for you, or them, to join us. We meet the fourth Tuesday of each month, January through October at 11:30 AM in the Garden Room at Mayfair. In November and December, we meet on the second Tuesday at 11:30 AM in the Garden Room.

Please feel free to contact me or others in our group if we can be of help. If you plan to come to a meeting, please let me (Iris Warren) know by the Sunday before the meeting, so we can prepare for the number of ladies who will attend. # I Will Dwell in the House of the LORD Forever

At the close of one of the most familiar passages in the Bible, David triumphantly announced, "Surely your goodness and love will follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the LORD forever" (Psalm 23:6 NIV).

Being in God's presence meant everything to David. Since he shared such a close relationship with the Lord, David could picture himself as a permanent resident in God's house, basking in His constant goodness, love, and care every day throughout eternity. And because death held the promise of eternal life in God's heavenly kingdom, David looked forward to the intimate and never-ending fellowship of dwelling in the house of the Lord forever.

In 2 Samuel, Chapter 7, we read that David was troubled because he lived in a fine palace while God lived "out there in a tent." David planned to build a fine palace in which God could reside. However, God would not allow David to build a house for Him. God, however, said He would build a house for David.

The "house" David wanted to build for the Lord was a temple. The "house" the Lord promised to build David was a posterity, a dynasty of kings. Although David was not permitted to build the temple, the Lord did build the house He promised David. The kings of Judah were descendants of David, as was the King of Kings—Jesus the Christ—who, interestingly, promised to help all who follow Him obtain "mansions" in the world to come (John 14:1–3 KJV).

The word "dwell" in Psalm 23:6 (NIV) means "to inhabit or live in." The house of the Lord is a term often referring to the Tabernacle, the temple, or the place of worship (as in Psalm 122:1 NIV). But here in Psalm 23:6 (NIV), the phrase speaks explicitly of "a dwelling house, palace, or local residence of a deity."

David wanted to abide in the presence of God forever. In the presence of God is the believer's true home. "Blessed are those you choose and bring near to live in your courts! We are filled with the good things of your house," declared David in Psalm 65:4 (NIV). And again, in Psalm 27:4 (NIV), we read of David's passionate and singular pursuit: "One thing I ask from the LORD, this only do I seek: that I may dwell in the house of the LORD all the days of my life, to gaze



on the beauty of the LORD and to seek him in his temple." To dwell in the house of the Lord forever was David's deepest longing.

Like David, the apostle Paul was sure that nothing in this life, not even death itself, could separate him from the loving presence of God: *"For I am convinced* that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 8:38 -39 NIV).

To dwell in the house of the Lord forever also suggests living with an attitude of a heart that expresses constant praise and worship. In Psalm 34, David exclaimed, *"I will praise the LORD at all times. I will constantly speak his praises" Psalm 34:1 (NLT).* Another psalmist declared, *"What joy for those who can live in your house, always singing your praises" (Psalm 84:4 NLT).* 

According to Psalm 84, "A single day in your courts is better than a thousand anywhere else." The verse continues: "I would rather be a gatekeeper in the house of my God than live the good life in the homes of the wicked" (Psalm 84:10 NLT). "Praise the LORD!" says another psalm. "Let all that I am praise the LORD. I will praise the LORD as long as I live. I will sing praises to my God with my dying breath" (Psalm 146:1–2 NLT).

The good things that God provides for us in this life are merely a foretaste of what awaits us in heaven. A glorious future day is coming when all the redeemed of the Lord will gather around the Lord's table in His eternal house. In heaven, as we dwell in the house of the Lord forever, we will enjoy full, uninterrupted fellowship with God.

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When our time in this earthly tent is complete, we "will dwell in the house of the Lord forever" (Psalm 23:6b). We will see the psalmist David dwelling there. Our family in the Lord will be there, too. Best of all, we will see Christ face to face. He will wipe away every tear, and we will worship Him forever (Revelation 21:3-4)! We are strengthened with joy day by day knowing that we will dwell in the house of the Lord forever. I'm reminded of an old hymn:

# **Ethics in the Hospital**

I began serving on Huntsville Hospital's Ethics Committee at its inception in about 1985. I served as cochair or chair of the committee for over 25 years.

The committee does not make decisions, except the setting of policy. We advise about ethical issues within the hospital when requested by a patient, family member, nurse, or doctor.

Advising involves ascertaining the pertinent medical issues, the family's position on the situation, and the ethical question involved.

Over the past 40 years, I have seen fewer ethical questions brought before the committee. The preponderance of the cases in recent years pertains to end-of-life decision-making. Who can decide on allowing a Do Not Resuscitate order to be written? Who decides if a feeding tube can be placed? The subtext I see in some consults is – "Can the committee make that decision." In the area of who can



make such a decision, Alabama Law is clear.

In statute, there is a hierarchy. Spouse or parent is first depending on marital status. Then siblings if no children and so on for around ten possible decision makers. The last on the list is a hospital ethics committee. Even when it comes to the bottom of the list the State Department of Human Resources must weigh in on the decision. My experience at Huntsville Hospital is that when DHR is informed, they defer to the hospital. In my tenure on the committee, I only know of one situation where the committee decided end-of-life.

Most often case managers and social services work hard to locate a decision-maker. When they are una-(Continued on page 9)

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ble to locate one, they petition the Probate judge to appoint a guardian, which can typically be accomplished within 24 hours in Madison County.

Recently, we had two requests for consultation which called for an opinion on the medical care provided. The answer was The Ethics Committee DOES NOT GIVE OPINIONS ON MEDICAL CARE PROVIDED. (The Medical Staff has processes in place to monitor and evaluate the care provided).

Then what guides the opinions rendered? That guidance comes from what is referred to as the four principles of medical ethics-autonomy, justice, beneficence, and non-maleficence.

Autonomy requires that a patient be allowed to make their own decisions without coercion or coaxing. There is a duty on the part of the provider to give pertinent information regarding the benefits and risks of any procedure, surgery, medication, or treatment plan that is being recommended. When a person is unable to make those decisions then a healthcare proxy is burdened with making those decisions in the manner, they perceive the patient would wish.

The second principle is justice. An aspect of justice is that the burdens and benefits of new or experimental treatments must be distributed equally among all groups of society.

A violation of this principle, as well as that of autonomy, and "do no harm," occurred from 1932 to 1972 when the United States Public Health Service and the CDC conducted a study in which a group of African American men were untreated and observed for syphilis over those 40 years.

The concept of justice also pertains to the equal distribution of healthcare. Sadly, the cost of innovative technologies and medications creates issues of justice.

The third principle is beneficence which demands that health care providers look to only doing good for each patient. This principle also demands that healthcare providers maintain, develop, and hone their skills for caring for patients through continual training and reading, striving always for the net benefit to patients.

The fourth principle of medical ethics is "do no intentional harm," which is self-explanatory. All these principles have nuances and challenges brought about by changes in society and innovation. These principles are constrained by state law, in my opinion.

In my deliberations, I have realized that I have used scripture as my guide. Always consider the greatest and the second greatest commands. "Love the Lord your God with all your soul, and with all your mind" Matthew 22:37 (NET) and "Love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:39 NET).

The one area where I still have difficulty pertains to the perception of quality of life. There are great differences of opinion of what is quality life. Some view being bedridden with little or no awareness of their surroundings as an acceptable quality. Others would not view that as quality. I am in the latter group, as are most physicians I find. This is where autonomy prevails, in my opinion.

I will close with a case scenario: Patient B has hepatitis C. They are hospitalized with total liver failure and admitted to ICU. B requires tremendous supportive care. With liver failure, he is unable to make clotting factors. There is excessive bleeding requiring many units of blood and platelets. The blood exposes nurses to hepatitis C. The nurses continue delivering the needed care. The outlook is extremely poor.

The family declines the request to transition to comfort care and a DO NOT RESUSCITATE order. They have stated they are waiting for a miracle. When the ethics committee convened to give an opinion, a wise member of the committee observed that the only way to know if a miracle would occur was to transition to comfort care. Sadly, for the family, a miracle did not occur that day. Just another day in the life of the Huntsville Hospital Ethics Committee.



#### **God's Adopted Children**

Most of you know all about the family you grew up in, as well as where your people originated: Who they were, where they immigrated from and emigrated to; what they did; who was born when; and who died when; where the family cemetery sits; and who lies there; who married whom; and how many twins there were in your family, going back generations.

Well, I did .... and I didn't. From my earliest memories, my parents (Clarence and Martha Neidert) told me how special I was, that I was more precious to them than any birth (or natural or blood) child. They couldn't have children and adopted me as "their best Christmas present ever," in December of 1960. I was born in Memphis and lived my first six months in the care of the nuns at St. Peter's Home for Children on Poplar Avenue (now part of the St. Jude campus).

All of us babies slept in cribs that were suspended from the ceiling by chains. I was adopted at six months. Those at St. Peter's had been there long enough for them to worry about my little soul, so they "baptized" (sprinkled) me in August of 1960. Just to be sure, my parents had me "christened" again later at Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Loretto, Tennessee.

Growing up I forgot I was adopted. I was Mom and Dad's son, pure and simple. Only when someone mentioned it - or I heard the word "adopted" - did it ever enter my mind. I never understood when people would mention that some child or other "acted the way they did" or "gave their parents trouble" because "THEY WERE ADOPTED!" I also thought - and still do - that this was a lame excuse - and easy scapegoat – for poor behavior. I had good parents and a good life. I can remember a time when I overheard a man say to my dad, "he's not your real son." I was furious (but stayed quiet) and was amazed (even more so now) that Dad handled it gently, and soothingly. I asked him later about it. He dismissed it as that man's ignorance. That was it and that was all. "The Spirit you received does not make you slaves, so that you live in fear again; rather, the Spirit you received brought about your **adoption** to sonship. And by him we cry, "Abba, Father" (Romans 8:15 NIV).

Our adoption by God, through our baptism and redemption in those waters, makes us all sons and daughters - redeemed children of our Creator God. We are told in Romans 8 that through this adoption, we need not fear anymore. What a wonderful message!




